Rep. Barrett meets with BHS government class

nents and opponents can express their views. Below is a review of a few select bills of interest that had some type of action.

HB 2396 (Property Tax Relief Bill): Property tax relief continues to be the most important issue for Kansans, which is why there are numerous proposals working their way through the legislature. I've covered many of these proposals already in previous newsletters, which you can view in my newsletter section at vote4barrett. com. The newest proposal that is getting a hearing this week is HB 2396, which empowers taxpayers to challenge excessive property tax increases through a protest petition process. If a local government raises taxes beyond a set limit, citizens have 30 days to gather signatures and force a rollback. Proponents state that the bill

prevents municipalities from taxing first and budgeting later, ensuring they justify spending increases. It also establishes the AS-TRA Fund to help cities and counties maintain services without unnecessary tax hikes. (The hearing took place at 3:30 p.m. March 4. You can watch the hearing after the fact on the Kansas Legislature YouTube page.)

Senate Bill 4 (Repealing 3-Day Grace Period for Mail Ballots): SB 4 was approved by the House, which requires all advance voting ballots to be received by 7 p.m. on Election Day to be counted, eliminating the current three-day grace period, which was enacted in 2017. This change aligns Kansas with most other states, ensuring a fair and transparent election process with clear deadlines. The bill prevents election delays, reduces post-election uncertainty, and eliminates reliance on inconsistent USPS postmarking, which is an issue that has been in the news after Secretary Scott Schwab found that the USPS didn't properly mark/handle ballots.

HB 2291 (Regulatory Sandbox and Relief): HB 2291 was approved by the House last week, and is currently in the Senate. HB 2291 creates a Regulatory Relief Division within

the Attorney General's office to help businesses challenge excessive regulations. It also establishes a sandbox program, allowing startups to test new products without immediate regulatory burdens. promoting innovation and economic growth. The bill ensures fairness through a bipartisan oversight committee while preventing unelected officials from stifling businesses. By reducing red tape, HB 2291 positions Kansas as a leader in free-market policies, making the state more business-friendly. This type of program has already been successfully implemented in states such as Utah.

Government Local Class Visits the State Capitol: This last week, Burlington School Senior Government Class, along with three eighth graders who served as pages, visited the State Capitol. Senator Tyson and I had the privilege of meeting with the class to discuss the legislative process. Additionally, I took the three eighth grade pages to the Lieutenant Governor's office, where they met the Lieutenant Governor and had their photo

➤ Awarding an \$89,216.96 bid for assorted culvert pipes to Contech Engineered Solutions.

➤ Designating April 14-19 as Spring Clean-Up Week, with the County Clerk publishing the notice.

➤ Soliciting sealed bids for: Approximately 100 miles of highway paint striping (S2501-C); Seasonal mowing at Old 50 Park, Rock Creek Cemetery, Hope Cemetery, and Strawn Monument (16th & Fauna); Seasonal mowing at Jacob's Creek Lagoons.

Additionally, the commission approved step increases for two heavy equipment operators who completed their probationary periods: Joshua Bruckner, wage increase from \$20.89 to \$21.28 (effective February 19); and Nathan Doerr, wage increase from \$21.68 to \$22.07 (effective February 26).

Executive Sessions The commission entered multiple executive sessions:

X40-minute and 20-minute sessions: Interviewing a candidate for the economic development director position, attended by County Counselor Bowie, Interim Economic Development Director Ronda Truelove, and the applicant.

X10-minute session: Including Bowie, to discuss the applicant, under the personnel matters of nonelected personnel exception to the Kansas Open Meetings Act (KOMA).

X5-minute session: Reviewing a legal document with Bowie, under the attorney-client privilege exception.

X10-minute session: Reviewing a contract document with Bowie, related to Marie Belle's, under attorney-client privilege.

No action was taken following these executive sessions.

Additionally, the commission authorized the chairman to sign a memorandum to department heads regarding Form CP-5 for one-step movement, and a contract with Lumineo Signs for installing new poly-metal panels with digitally printed graphics at the county sign south of Coffey County Airport (\$7,950).

Before adjourning, commissioners reviewed and signed February vouchers and warrants.

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


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
