100 Years Ago December 4, 1924

The first steps have been taken to have a federal aid road connecting Troy and Atchison. The commission approved \$48,000 federal aid on the 16 mile highway, Troy to Atchison, and placed the road on the state highway system, it was announced by L. R. Tillotson, state highway engineer. The County Commissioners from Doniphan and Atchison were in Topeka, Tuesday for the securing of federal aid to connect the road. The state highway commission and federal aid commission will send engineers into the two counties as soon as possible to determine the most feasible routing for such a road.

The First Annual Doniphan County Poultry Show started off yesterday, with prospects of a very successful show. The officers of this organization have worked hard to make this first show a success and the people should attend to show their appreciation. There is no admission charged. About 600 birds, including chickens, geese, ducks, turkeys, and guineas from Nebraska, Missouri, and Kansas are on exhibition. One of the features of the show is a laying contest including pens from Shannon, Atchison, Elwood, and Troy. In each pen are five hens. The pen that produces the greatest number of eggs during the show wins the prize.

One of the Kansans who has made good in an emphatic way in Washington official life is Edwin Brown of Troy, appointed in September as an assistant in the attorney general's department. With only two months service to his credit, this Doniphan county lawyer has won the confidence and esteem of his superiors.

Troy Leads with Tax Valuation with Highland Second—The city of Troy leads the other towns of the county with a total valuation of \$1,041,500. Highland is second with a valuation of \$917,361.

George Larson had a close call Tuesday, when a truck he was driving broke through the temporary bridge spanning Wolf River at Sparks. The truck landed in the river about 20 feet below, but fortunately George landed on top. A small bone in his wrist was broken.

Henry Wagenknecht, well known architect of St. Joseph, Mo., has been selected as the architect to draw up the plans for the proposed Masonic building to be erected in Troy. Mr. Wagenknecht is no stranger to the people of Troy and Doniphan County. He is the son of J.H. Wagenknecht, contractor, and spent his boyhood days in Wathena. The father erected the courthouse here at Troy.

Charges may be filed against two NEKA Vo-Tech School students at Atchison after a counterfeiting operation was uncovered. A sheet of bogus \$20 bills was found caught in the press. The Atchison Police and U.S. Secret Service reportedly recovered \$59,000 worth of the counterfeit bills.

15 Years Ago December 3, 2009

The purchase of interior security cameras for the law enforcement center, at a cost of \$11,864, was approved Monday during the Board of County Commissioners meeting. Sheriff Jerry Dubach explained that the security cameras are needed for the inmate cells located in the upper (main floor) level of the jail.

Unified School District #425 of Highland and USD No. 433 Midway at Denton are now history. In February 2008 voters of the two school districts approved consolidation, creating Doniphan West USD No. 111. Next week, alumni of the two former school districts will have an opportunity to preserve a part of their former school's history, with the purchase of school memorabilia. On Tuesday, December 8, more than 50 items from the two now-defunct school districts—mainly sports banners—will be offered as part of the Kansas Government Surplus Auction. It is being conducted on the Internet. Bids are being accepted prior to that date. The items to be auctioned include decor, sporting goods, and sports collectibles. One of two decor items is a concrete Midway Eagle mascot.

Wathena Garden Club is sponsoring a holiday homes tour Saturday, Dec. 5, 10:00-4:00. Eight homes, decorated for the holidays, will be featured.

The Doniphan County Services and Workskills, Inc., recently held an appreciation dinner at the Wathena Community Building. It also was the 25th anniversary observance of the not-for-profit agency that serves people with mental and/or physical disabilities. 100 Years Ago, December 4, 1924

The first inter-school basketball game of the season for the local school was played on the high school court last Friday evening when the Denton girls defeated the Highland girls 34 to 18. On the same evening and at the same place Coach L. W. Stricker's masculine basketeers from Sparks suffered a 10 to 25 defeat at the hands of the Denton boys.

A fire which broke out in the basement furnace room of the main college building at 5 o'clock Wednesday afternoon, November 26, badly damaged the furnace and all basement rooms. Burned the floor out of the chemistry supply room on the first floor, practically destroyed all the chemistry laboratory equipment, and smoked up the entire building.

Frank Potter, living north of the Station, was shot by his son Tuesday night. They were watching for a person they thought had been stealing their hogs when the son shot at the supposed thief and was immediately horrified to find his mistake. Mr. Potter probably will recover.

Bill Peabody bought a Freshman Masterpiece radio set from Hegenderfer & Son last week.
