Spring is finally here, and it's time to take care of our blooming landscapes. This is a busy season for most of us, but getting outside can be relaxing and rewarding. Use this helpful checklist to have a colorful landscape this year.

Vegetables and Fruits •Start fruit tree spray schedule when growth begins

•Plant carrots, onions, beets, and other salad crops in early April

•Thin radishes, beets, and carrots as needed

•Harvest asparagus until spear size decreases.

•Prune fruit trees if not already done

•Plant new fruit trees

•Plant asparagus and rhubarb •Remove mulch from

strawberry bed •Prune raspberry and

blackberry plantings •Plant beans, corn, and vine crops in late April

•Cultivate to control seedling weed growth


