### Motorists encouraged to be on the lookout for deer

Vehicle-deer crashes can happen any day of the year Kansas roadways. Across the state, 39% of all single-vehicle crashes in 2024 involved a collision with a deer. The Kansas Department of Transportation reports five people were killed and 674 people were injured in collisions with deer in 2024.

These crashes greatly increase from now until the end of the year because of deer breeding season, with November typically the peak time.

This is why KDOT, the Kansas Highway Patrol, the Kansas Department of Wildlife and Parks, AAA Kansas and the Kansas Turnpike Authority are joining to raise awareness and help decrease deer-vehicle crashes.

"Serious crashes are more likely to occur when drivers swerve to avoid a deer, as this can lead to loss of vehicle control, departure from the roadway or collisions with oncoming traffic," said KHP Lieutenant Chad Crittenden. "It is often safer to brake firmly and stay in your

Shawn Steward, Public Affairs Manager for AAA Kansas, said that in addition to the inconvenience of your vehicle damage, the cost of repairs may put a serious dent in your wallet, especially if you don't have comprehensive auto insur-

ance coverage. "AAA insurance statistics show the average claim in Kansas for an animal strike in 2024 was \$8,430 up 103% in just five years," Steward said. "This is largely due to advanced vehicle technology such as cameras and sensors, driving up the cost of repairs."

Anyone involved in a collision with a deer or other animal resulting in personal injury or property damage totaling \$1,000 or more is required to immediately report the incident to the nearest law enforcement agency.

KDWP prioritizes reducing deer-vehicle collisions in managing the Kansas deer population. However, motorists should be prepared for a higher risk of collisions in the fall, said Levi Jaster, KDWP Big Game Program Coordina-

## **Big Kansas Road Trip Pop Up for 2026 Announced**

Humboldt in southeast Kansas will be the first Big Kansas Road Trip (BKRT) Pop Up site for 2026. A project of the Kansas Sampler Foundation, the daylong showcase will take place on Saturday, May 2 with some activities starting the day before.

Marci Penner, Foundation Director, announced the news at the opening "Stump" session in Hoxie during the third Pop Up of 2025 that took place throughout Sheridan County on October 4. The BKRT Pop Up is an event that feels like a community open house for attractions and locally-owned shops and restaurants. Also on the menu of things to see and do are mini-talks and tours that feature unusual or intriguing places and stories not normally shared with the public.

Simone Elder, Foundation Power Up & Engagement Manager, said, "All we ask is that the community be good at being itself. The public seeks first-hand experiences in a rural community and this event delivers exactly that." The core audience at the Pop Ups are members of the Foundation's Kansas Explorers

In Humboldt, visitors will find a 19th-century woodworking shop, the Whitetails & Wildlife Museum, a music hall in a con-
