## Summer Movie Nights get new locations, split from concert series

The Garden City Parks and Recreation Department's annual summer Movie Nights are changing locations for 2025.

Katie Cole, Recreation Coordinator with GCPR, said instead of being at Stevens Park every time, the Movie Nights this year will move around to different parks in Garden City.

"I wanted to make it so it's a more local thing," she said. "So people can walk or go with their family and their neighbors and go to kind of more their community park - bring a blanket, bring some chairs ... have it be more of a neighborhood feel if you're getting together with all of your neighbors, going somewhere that's a little bit closer."

Cole said she feels like if the event is only at Stevens Park, not everybody knows about it, whereas if it's right there near you, it's going to be more fun.

The Movie Nights will be held basically every other Saturday through June and July, Cole said.

The first one will be on June 14 at Deane Wiley Park, then June 28 at Finnup-Scout Park,

Cole said she's still figuring out sponsors, so she doesn't know which movies will be happening on which days as the sponsors get to select that, but the movies they've chosen are: "Sonic 3", "The Wild Robot", "Inside Out 2", "Dog Man" and "The Lego Movie".

She estimates that the movies will be playing around 9-9:30 p.m., once it's dark enough.
