## **HEART OF A TIGER**

## Meet Honesty Beaton - innovator, leader, change-maker

HAYS - Few embody the spirit of resilience and innovation like Honesty Beaton, a senior Computer Science major at Fort Hays State University (FHSU).

first-generation college student from Wichita, Honesty's educational journey is a tribute to her determination, a shining example of what can be achieved when passion meets opportunity.

From an early age, Honesty was a tech-savvy problem solver who was always ready to tackle any technology-related challenge. It was this natural inclination towards technology that sparked her interest in the field of computer science, eventually guiding her to FHSU.

"I didn't think college was an option until my high school advisor, Cammie Kennedy, encouraged me to explore

it," Honesty recalls. After her initial visit to Fort Hays, she was drawn to the friendly and supportive atmosphere of the campus, where she felt a sense of belonging.

experience, Honesty faced obstacles common among many of our students. Balancing two jobs while managing her coursework was no small feat, yet she found solace in the strong support networks at FHSU. Friends from freshman orientation became lifelong companions, while dedicated peers and mentors boosted her

confidence and encouraged her to reach new heights.

One pivotal moment in Honesty's FHSU journey was participating in a course on "Video Game Creation." Under the guidance of Gordon Carlson, Honesty and her team developed a game from scratch, sparking a passion within her for programming and design. This course honed her technical skills and opened doors to exciting research opportunities.

Carlson recognized her enthusiasm and invited her to collaborate on a year-long research project called Realtime Video Underlay, culminating in a presentation about the project at the 2024 Faulkner Challenge—a milestone Honesty never imagined when she began her college career.

Her accomplishments didn't stop there. As one of the first undergraduate Student Mixed Reality Developers at the Institute for New Media Studies, Honesty was at the forefront of technological innovation on campus, working alongside her peers to tackle complex problems.

"FHSU encourages exploration and creativity," she notes. "I've had the chance to work with augmented reality, virtual reality, and projection mapping, ideas that expand our understand-

Honesty's future is bright and filled with promise. She plans to graduate in December 2025 with her Bachelor of Science degree and transition into an FHSU master's degree program in cybersecurity and a new role as a Graduate Research **Assistant** with Institute. She also plans to gain real-world professional experience as a

data engineering intern in its mission to nurture at Centene, a Missouribased healthcare solutions company.

As Honesty reflects on her journey, she acknowledges the challenges and the invaluable lessons learned along the way. 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to go through that training and their first year is actually going to be potentially their fifth year in

a classroom." Those enrolled in the program are going to "earn while they learn," Thon said. They're going to make money while they're learning in the classroom and learning through their college courses.

"Going to college is really expensive, so, they're going to get some funding from KSDE to help pay for their tuition, their books, their fees, and we'll also get some funding in this, and ... for our mentor teachers," she said.

One-on-one mentorship is a big part of this program, Thon said. The district already has a mentor program, and they're going to bulk that up as well for all the new teachers, but those in the TAP program are going to greatly benefit from that mentorship.

"Then that seamless transition, so, they actually will not have their traditional student teaching semester like they would normally, that's going to be just all rolled into this whole program," she said.

The four biggest parts of the TAP program are coursework, mentorship, tiered classroom experience and professional development, Thon said.

The apprentices must be enrolled in classes, which will be rigorous, Thon said. Even if they're starting from the ground up, they should only be in the program for four

"Four years is pretty quick, they're going to have to be full-time in college classes, but that's part of it," she said. "The mentorship is another big piece; we will pay our mentors, our guiding teachers, to help really give them that time and that effort as well."

said Thon tiered classroom experience is a huge part of the program, in it the apprentices will be accessed where they're at every semester and will be given goals and will works towards taking over lessons.

"As time goes on, they're going to take over, they're going to create some lessons, they're going to teach some more lessons, they're going to grade some papers," she said. "As time goes on, that's just going to roll into being the person leading the class."

The apprentices will also take part in the same teacher in-service dates with their mentors, Thon said.

"We don't want them to miss out on anything that they would otherwise not have," she said.

Thon said most people can apply, it'll be opened internally and externally for applications.

The applicants must complete the application through KSDE, the district must do a portion of it as well; they must be enrolled or able to enroll in teacher education programs; and the district will ask them to commit to USD 457 for two years once they've completed the program, Thon said.

The application period for the program ends May 20, as the applications aren't due to KSDE

until June 1, Thon said. "It's going to be a little bit of a quick turnaround, but we're going to be able to get those teachers in, or apprentices in, interview them and find out who's going to be the best to start in the fall," she said.

Drew Thon, USD 457 Chief Human Resources Officer, said the district will start out with five apprentices this first

"We want to make sure that these five are getting all the attention that they need to get, that they're getting the experience they need to get," he said. "As things progress and we create systems and put systems in place and checks and bal-

ances in place, yeah,

we're going to ask to eventually ramp up the program."

He said a big upside with this program compared to other programs like Transition to Teach is that the apprentices will have been embedded in the classroom for years before they become a full-fledged teacher.

"We count our lucky stars every single day for every long-term sub that became a teacher and everybody that's gone through a non-traditional pathway," he said. "But the biggest problem that we've seen is their first-year teaching is their firstyear teaching."

Additionally, a lot of the teachers will probably end up staying in the same building, Drew Thon said.

"What we're doing is we're putting people in place that we know fit our culture, they fit our values, they fit what we're trying to do, because they've been with us for anywhere to two to four years," he
