
Obituaries

Commissioners to hear request for Old Highway 40 renovations near Victoria

Ellis County Commissioners plan to renovations to Victoria off of Old Highway 40, including a request from the City of Victoria that the county pay one-third of the cost for both the East Main Street and West Main Street approaches.

The total cost comes down to \$79,748.34; East Main Street will total \$41,561.67 and West Main Street will total \$38,186.37.

The Agenda Cover Sheet states that the approaches are breaking out and leaving large potholes within driving lanes. East Main Street has been made the priority due to the higher traffic levels of both passenger and vehicle trucks.

The discussion and request will be presented by Ellis County Public Works Director Brendan Mackay and Victoria Mayor John Schulte. The meeting is expected to solely focus on the Commissioners consideration of the funding request, a formal approval to take place at a future meeting when a purchase order and funding options are

The May 20 Ellis County Commission meeting will also include the public's ongoing "Rural Subdivision Conversations" [Agenda Item XII. Subdivision Road Infrastructure Discussion], Monthly Departmental Reports and the Adams Brown County Audit Report; Cottonwood Extension District update, Wild West Festival Waste Fees Waiver, and County Sheriff's Office purchases of Detention Officers' Armor Grants, Car/Body Cameras, Cradlepoints, and Antenna Replacements.

Summer watering restrictions begin June 1st

During the May 13, 2025, City Press Briefing, Hays Water Conservation Specialist Holly Dickman announced City's Summer 2025 Watering Restrictions

"In response to a request made by the City of Hays, the Kansas Department of Agriculture's Division of Water Resources has issued a control order restricting the watering of lawns and other vegetation from private wells between noon and 7:00 p.m. from June 1, 2025, through September 30, 2025," said Dickman. She noted that the water restrictions are part of a greater interest to

reduce water waste and to improve conservation practices in the Intensive Groundwater Use Control Area (IGUCA) located in Hays, Kansas.

Established in 1985 to help implement the City's water conservation measures, the Hays IGUCA provides a mechanism to prevent water waste by privately-owned

"By restricting all outdoor water between noon and 7:00 p.m. (6/1-9/30/2025), including the watering of landscapes and gardens, unnecessary water loss due to wind and evaporation can be reduced, thus conserving the resource for more efficient use," Dickman said.

In addition to Summer Watering Restrictions, Hays' year-round water controls prohibit the washing down of sidewalks, parking lots and driveways; the known loss of water through breaks or leaks in plumbing systems; and the escape of water from private property onto public property such as sidewalks or into the street guttering from landscape irrigation.

Dickman encouraged all citizens to practice the conservation of natural resources, including water, and look for ways to improve conservation measures in our homes and businesses, both indoors and out.
