Tabor announces campaign to raise \$90 million

Tabor College has officially launched a historic, \$90 million fundraising initiative to celebrate God's faithfulness, raise key funds across campus and build on a rich legacy to secure a thriving future for generations of students.

Having already raised \$30 million since 2021, Tabor seeks to complete the campaign by 2030, strengthening the college's foundation, serving past, present, and future students with premier facilities, renovations to its two most historic buildings, key fundraising to support student scholarships, improve housing, and continue the rapid rise of the college's endowment.

"The Next Century Campaign builds on our legacy with a bold vision to enhance our campus, strengthen programs and ensure a thriving future," said President David Janzen, Ph.D. "With your partnership, Tabor will continue to prepare students for a life of learning, work and service for Christ and his kingdom for the next century and beyond."

The college plans to transform and expand the former Mary J. Regier Building into a state-of-the-art Business and Entrepreneurship Center (BEC). A public launch of fundraising for the facility began in fall 2024 and with a \$1.3 million Mabee Challenge Grant issued just months later, Tabor is nearing its \$11 million fundraising goal for the renovation of the former Mary J. Regier Building and a north expansion that connects to the west side of the Solomon L. Loewen Natural Science Center.

This facility will house classes and events in business, Tabor's largest major, and offer tremendous space to support ideation and co-working for budding entrepreneurs across campus. It will also house the Central Kansas Entrepreneurship Center.

"Our goal is to start companies and non-profits that take Christ into the world," Janzen said. "We want to inspire and equip people to use their ventures to share Jesus with employees, vendors, and customers, to operate with integrity and love and to use their resources to advance Christ's kingdom as they support ministries including Tabor."

The H.W. Lohrenz Administration Building will be enhanced and restored to maintain its history and add key features to cement its place on Tabor's campus. Plans include restoring its exterior brick, replacing windows, reglazing the Corinthian columns, adding an elevator and restoring historic stained-glass windows on the east side of the build-

ing.

Tabor opened a brand-new maintenance facility in 2022, and its newest residence hall, Jost Hall, opened in 2023. The college plans to build two new residence halls in the coming years. East Hall, a part of women's quad housing, will soon be renovated.

Since 2023, the college has had its two best fundraising years including nearly \$4 million to support student scholarships and programs.

Because of this support, the college has re-launched, will soon open or started programs in data analytics, computer science, nursing (through a partnership with Hesston College), a new M.B.A. concentration in healthcare leadership and graduate work in ministry.

Tabor opened its first three fully funded endowed professorships in August 2023, adding key funding that freed money to fund student scholarships and other operations.

"Growing our endowment is key in keeping a Tabor education affordable," Ron Braun, vice president of philanthropy, said. "Thanks to generous alumni and friends, endowed funds have grown by 50 percent since 2023. That is remarkable, and now, we seek to increase it from \$30 to \$50 million by 2030."

RESOLUTION: Salaries for Township Board Officers

A RESOLUTION ESTABLISHING RATES OF COMPENSATION TO BE PAID TO TOWNSHIP OFFICERS OF SPRING VALLEY TOWNSHIP

WHEREAS, Spring Valley Township desires to establish reasonable rates of compensation to be paid to township board members for certain services while actually and necessarily conducting the business of said township, and,

WHEREAS, to township is authorized to determine such compensation under the authority of HOUSE SUBSTITUTE FOR SENATE BILL No. 541 published in the Kansas Register on May 2, 1996.

SECTION 1. The Spring Valley Township Board hereby fixes and establishes the following rates and amounts of compensation for township officers, and the Board finds and determines the same to be reasonable compensation for services performed while actually and necessarily attending to and conducting township business:

- For services performed by each officer in attending to the township business as an officer, board member or auditing board member: \$500 per 1/4.
- For services performed by each officer serving as highway commissioner: \$0.
- For attendance to the annual one-day meeting called by the County Engineer: \$125 per meeting.
- For services performed by each officer performing work and labor on the township roads and bridges: \$25 per hour.
- For services performed by an officer designated by the township board to act as road overseer: \$20 per hour.

SECTION 2: This resolution shall be published once each week for two consecutive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation within the township. This resolution shall not become effective until 30 days following the date of the second said publication.
