Goessel hears mosquito control and street maintenance plans

Goessel city council met on May 19 and heard public works director Alex Goossen's plans for patching streets and controlling mosquitoes.

Goossen had checked the cost of asphalt millings. Three truck loads would cost \$885 and would be used on Wheat Street, possibly other streets later. Mayor Evan Esau commented that "millings are not the cheapest solution, but they keep the dust down." The council also talked about creating a crown for the streets.

Goossen also talked with the council about holes in the pavement that need to be patched. Asphalt cold patch would cost \$812 for a 56-bag pallet. Every pothole will need a bag. Goossen said he can do the patching, noting that the holes need to be cleaned properly. The patch material has oil and needs to be packed

tightly.

Goossen also told the council about mosquito control training he had attended. A case of 220 briquets will cost \$886. However some prices are likely to double by September because of tariffs.

The briquets have a 130-day release time and go directly into the water. Goossen explained that mosquito larvae eat the product, and it prevents the larvae from becoming adult mosquitoes. However, adult mosquitoes need to be controlled by "fogging." The best time for fogging is 7:30-8:45 p.m. Only specific areas will be fogged.

Turning their attention to another matter, the council listened to Friday Otuya of Nex-Tech. He talked about fiber that is in the ground and is not a tower. He also talked about resources that are available to the community, such as the Nex-Tech "academy" that can provide training for the com-




