Mechanical woodland creatures to return to Koester Block gazebo

Mechanical animals will return to downtown Marysville during the Christmas season this year, more than four decades after they first appeared in the Koester Block gazebo.

The festive holiday display includes a big stuffed bear playing bells, three black squirrels with trumpet, drum and bells, a deer with bells hanging from its antlers, a red fox with bass fiddle and a raccoon. All have been rescued from storage in a second-floor hallway of the block's historic commercial buildings.

The critters are in good shape, needing only minor repairs and oiling of their electrical parts, brushing and grooming of their fur.

The gazebo, built in 1983, housed the animated display during the Christmas season but needs repair to replace its spindled Victorian railing and holiday lights. The animated display has been in storage since the early 1990s.

A group of volunteers headed by Rory Clark has been organized to support the project, and the mechanical critters were moved recently to the OneMarysville office on Broadway. Greg Suter of Wichita, who owns an extensive collection of similar mechanical displays and has experience with their restoration, came

County approves Landoll tax abatement

A resolution for a 10year tax abatement for Landoll Rentals LLC and Landoll Corporation for a new building and equipment in Waterville was approved unanimously Monday by the Marshall County commissioners.

In the 40-minute public hearing, commissioners heard from Landoll officials and representatives of Valley Heights USD

498. Because Waterville is in the Valley Heights school district, the proposed tax abatement would affect the district. In addition, commissioners had several questions during discussion.

The resolution is part of the paperwork that will be forwarded to the Kansas Board of Tax Appeals for a final determination.

Valley Heights Superintendent Sean Spoonts said, "We are in support

Marysville drops to Class 2A next fall in football and will spend two seasons there while all other area schools are to remain in their current classifications.

In other sports, Marysville still will be considered a 3A school.

"I'm not really sure yet what I think of us dropping to 2A," said MHS football coach Tony Trimble. "I know that 2A and 3A both have some really good teams. Some of the downside is we will not be able to play all of our league teams as long as we stay 2A.

"If we fill all of our non-district games with league schools we will only

Enrollments show decline

A decline in enrollment is a trend this year among Marshall County schools, and Marysville lost more students than neighboring smaller schools.

Marysville USD 364 reported to the state it had 747 students, a decrease of 34 students from last year. The decline was expected, and Superintendent Darren Schroeder talked to the school board this summer about it. The district budgeted for the loss but had hoped to gain students before Sept. 22, the official day to report enrollment figures to the state.
