ner on the boys' team, was joking when he told her after the race what she had done.

"It does mean a lot that I am able to have that (record) and use my goal to push myself," Warders said.

The season started with her wanting to qualify for state, but now she wants more.

"I want to make state and break 21 minutes," she said.

Warders said she decided to go out for cross country because she was told she had potential after running middle distance during track in junior high.

"I like distance running but prefer mid-distance," she said.

She trains with Langston Gray, another freshman. The two ran a 10K in the summer and they push each other in practice.

"Langston Gray really pushed me and helps me through my races," she said. "He is also such a good friend and I am really happy we get to run together."

She has the wisdom from her father, Dusty Warders, who is a former runner.

"He is a big help with my running although I sometimes don't like all the yelling," she said. "I know he's doing it to make me better and I really appreciate it."

She's already learned that distance running is as much a mind or mental state as it is physical. If she can break 21:49.5, she could be a top 50 freshman runner in the state among all classes. She is 26th among 2A runners in Kansas and breaking 22:05.4 should land her in the top 20.

"I want to become really fast," Warders said.

Many area runners set PRs

Personal bests were not that easy to come by but were attainable for several area cross country runners last Thursday in the Nemaha Central Invitational.

Centralia girls won the meet with 33 points and Axtell was fourth with 115. In the boys' division, Axtell was second with 70 points and Centralia was fourth with 95. Valley Heights, which did field teams, had runners set personal bests.

Runners will compete at 10 a.m. Saturday at Centralia Lake, which will give several

of them a chance to see what the Twin Valley League course will be like on Oct. 16. Axtell will compete Thursday at Horton.

In the girls' race at Nemaha Central, Emma Warders, Heights, broke her personal best and finished fourth in 22:22.5, an improvement of 11 seconds.

Kya Franklin led Centralia with a fifth-place finish in 22:26.9 and teammate Kaylee Olberding was not far behind in a personal best 22:28.3 to finish sixth. Rounding out the Panther scoring

was Keelyn Rempe, who was ninth in 22:53.5, and Kambrie Rempe, 12th, 24:02.9.

Axtell's lead runner Regan Hasenkamp finished 13th in 24:23 and teammate Claire Buessing was 16th in 24:36.5. Eagle Elaina Bergmann was 26th in 25:44, and Maggie Strathman was 39th in 27:35.9.

Warders wasn't the only Mustang to PR. Teammate Riley Skalla fished 18th in a personal best 24:56.1.

In the boys' race, Kebeb Zimmerman was fourth in 17:42.6, which was a personal best

by 16.98 seconds from the previous week at Onaga. Teammate Langston Gray was seventh in 18:39.2.

Centralia's senior twins of Kristopher and Gavin Fulkerson finished fifth and sixth. Kristopher ran a season best in 18:12.7. He has 11.1 seconds to drop to match his personal best 18:01.6 as a sophomore. Gavin was sixth in 18:26.2.

Axtell's lead runner was Henry Stallbauer, who was 12th in 18:55.2. Teammate Bill Lybarger was 14th in a personal best 19:08.5.
