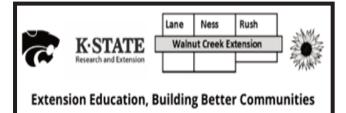

# INSIGHT WITH EXTENSION Barntalk: Testing Bales by Jared Petersilie, Agriculture Agent Walnut Creek Extension District

By the time you are reading this, all 3 fairs for the Walnut Creek District will be 'in the books.' That means school is not far off for the majority and while we have had many hot days, we've had plenty of humidity to go along with it. Moisture continues to be spotty and streaky, but everyone has received something. Bales are a common sight around the area and there are definitely more to come. As you move and stack those bales, keep in mind that a nutrient analysis will go a long way to keeping these high priced critters happy and healthy.

If drought stress is prevalent in the forage sorghums, keeping the knives or sickles up 6-8" will help keep the Nitrates in the field and not in the bale. A little extra stubble will also help get some regrowth late this summer and into this fall. Nitrogen is a building block for protein, so a little 'N' in the feed is not a bad thing, but a little too much means we have some headaches to work thru.

We typically keep analysis bags for Servi-Tech (Dodge City), SDK (Hutchinson) and MidWest Labs (Omaha based) on hand. Each lab runs tests a little differently and reports their findings a little differently too, but the data at the end is relatively the same. Each lab provides results that are just as good as the sample that was sent in. This is why stopping in to check out a bale probe is important... we want very random samples from a wide cross sampling of bales. If you swathed and baled with the contour (terraces) or swathed the drought stressed feed separately from the 'big stuff' then we might recommend two or more tests.

Over the last several years, we have a renewed awareness of Nitrates, but we also need to be cognizant of Prussic Acid (both for haying and grazing). If you have worked to prepare a 'good' sample for analysis for nitrate testing, then take it one small step further and get a nutrient analysis as well. This will tell us what TDN (total digestibly nutrients), DM (dry matter), CP (crude protein), ADF/NDF (Fibers), and just as important is what the energy numbers for maintenance, milk, and growth are. When balancing rations, the net energy (NE) availability is critical. This is why a pound or two of corn or milo (starch) every day or every few days makes a huge difference in a cows' Body Condition Score.

Many producers pride themselves on not feeding grain to the cows, but with the current grain prices relative to the cattle prices, its the cheapest and most efficient way to not only boost their nutrition but to actually feed in some quantity if equipped to do so.

If the feed to be tested is alfalfa, then we can get RFV (relative feed value) or RFQ (relative feed quality) results. These numbers are very helpful in marketing hay, but are not used in balancing rations. Grass type forages can get an RFV, but its not useful to marketing or to rations. When checking the boxes on the bag, be sure to ask what each option means and if its something you can use.

Another tid-bit of information: Blister Beetles are swarming. They are not new by any means, but they are showing up in places that we have not typically seen them before. If you have horses or are sourcing alfalfa for horses, please be vigilant. Deciphering the test results is a conversation for another episode, but visit your local extension office for help in determining what tests are needed and how to use the results.
