Also present was Ashley Maxwell, Clerk, Travis Story, Assistant Road Supervisor, Mitch Fritz, Road Supervisor and Gary Baetz, Blade Foreman.

At 7:08 a.m. Gwennap called the meeting to order. Baetz and the commissioners discussed the following: Kurt Ifland joined the meet-

1.
