Lebo Stars and Stripes July 3-6

LEBO — Lebo's 36th Annual Stars and Stripes Celebration, themed "ART-RAGEOUS," will take place July 3-6, with a full lineup of familyfriendly events and patriotic activities. High-lights include fireworks Thursday evening and the parade 11 a.m. Friday, July 4, with longtime residents Ted and Mary Vannocker serving as parade marshals.

The concession stands sponsored by the Lebo Junior Class and Freshman Class ice cream fundraising will be available near the event locations throughout the four-day event.

The festivities kick off at 6:30 p.m. Thursday, July 3, at West Park with turtle races, a foam machine, cornhole, wiffleball, sand volleyball, and concessions. Fireworks, presented by Courtney Bartley and Rainbow Fireworks, will light up the sky at dusk.

On Friday, July 4, the Lebo Sophomore Class will serve a biscuit and gravy breakfast from 7 to 10 a.m. at the school commons.

At 9 a.m., the baby and toddler costume contests will be held at the community building. The baby contest will have two divisions: age newborn to 6 months and 7 to 12 months. Babies are to wear diapers or white onesies. The toddler costume will range from age 13 months to 5 years.

A cornhole tournament at Heidi Inn starts at 10 a.m.

The parade begins at 11 a.m., forming at North Jones Park, where en-tries will be judged. Those walking in the parade and the grand marshals will gather in the Vo-Ag parking lot. The parade will travel south on Ogden Street and turn west on Broadway Street.

A senior class BBQ lunch will follow at the school commons from 12:30 to 2 p.m.

Coffey County Council for the Arts will sponsor acrylic painting classes at the community building Friday afternoon, led by Celina Soukup. A children's session will run from 1 to 2:30 p.m. and an adult class from 3:30 to 6 p.m. The class has a limit of 25 kids with a fee of \$5. The Coffey County Art Council is picking up the rest of the fee. Younger kids will need an adult to

Coffey County Commission reviews budget requests, other business

Coffey County Commission handled a range of business matters during its regular meeting Monday, June 23, addressing housing mortgage releases, economic development opportunities, budget requests, and lease agreement.

Chairman Wayde Thomsen called the meeting to order with commissioners Michael Abendroth, Mark Petterson, Steve McCurry and Todd Barker present. Also attending were County Clerk Angie Kirchner, County Counselor Wade Bowie II, and several department heads and guests.

The commission approved two real estate mortgage releases upon recommendation from the Coffey County Housing Authority Board. The first release satisfied a mortgage for Doris F. Terrell on lots 6 and 7 in Block 157 in Burlington. The second release cleared a mortgage for Nancy Loney on lots 14,

16, and 18 in Block 22 of the

Maxson and Beadles addition in Lebo.

Economic Development Director Jenny Tatman, along with Kansas Department of Commerce Senior Regional Director Craig VanWey, joined the meeting virtually to discuss potential funding and partnership opportunities aimed at attracting new businesses to Coffey County (See separate story).

The board heard from County Appraiser Connie Lawrence, who requested approval of a consulting agreement with McCully & Associates to perform appraisal analysis, for \$20,500 annually. Earlier this year, Lawrence combined two positions and does not plan to replace a now vacant position. The commission took no action on the request during the meeting.

Recycling Coordinator Todd Bemis met with the board during two executive sessions, totaling 25 minutes, to discuss personnel matters related to job performance. No decisions were announced following the closed sessions.

Road and Bridge Supervisor Adam Hoch updated the commission on the county's dump truck purchases. Hoch reported that manufacturer Henderson is offering a \$2,000 discount on each truck currently being built, as well as a 4 percent discount on any future orders.

Commissioners held a brief 5-minute executive session with County Counselor Wade Bowie II to discuss legal matters related to a payroll notice.

Following the executive sessions, the commission conducted a brief walkthrough of a basement storage area and reviewed 2026
