In his own report, Palser touched on five areas specifically: June 2025 policy updates, a board policy, field trips, a water drainage issue at Galesburg and the 2024-25 budget closeout report.

For Coover and Bachman, they attended a KASB training seminar on state assessments, spending three days in Topeka. "I had no idea what I was

getting into," Coover shared. The session focused on all

four levels of each standard. During the seminar, each teacher completed a 54-question

test with each question getting progressively more difficult.

"One was the easiest, and 54 was the hardest," Bachman teased, "so I started out strong." "It was very enlightening," Coover added. "There was so much information. I would do it again."

Bachman concluded with a statement parents and guardians might find very helpful.

"They are trying to modify (state assessment scores) to be more 'parental friendly," he said. "I'm glad they are admitting the flaws and willing to address it."

Brown shared the state passed a law that requires school district buildings to incorporate a cardiac response plan, similar to a fire drill.

"A cardiac arrest is different than a heart attack," Brown explained, adding that the goal is to have an AED (automated external defibrillator) within 3 minutes at any of the sites. She said using an AED within 3 minutes of an emergency drastically increases the chance of surviving.

She also shared a video with the board. Part of her presentation included adding an EKG scan "for our kids."

"The cost is \$20 per person and there are grants and funds for parents who cannot afford it," Brown added.

Brown hopes to have a booth set up during "Bean Week" to share the information.

"The Response Plan we have to file with the State," Palser said, adding he sent a proposal to KASB for review.

King was straight to the point in his message.
