RESOLUTION NO. 15-2025

RESOLUTION AND NOTICE OF HEARING WITH REFERENCE TO ALLEGED UNSAFE AND **DANGEROUS STRUCTURE AND ACCESSORY STRUCTURE**

Whereas, the Chief of the Fire Department and the Building Official of the City of Fort Scott, Kansas, pursuant to the provisions of Ordinance No. 3507 and 3500 of said City, has filed with the Board of Commissioners, the body of said City, a statement in writing that the structure (and accessory structure) located at [402 N. SHUTE] is unsafe for human habitation due to the dilapidated, unrepaired, and unsanitary condition of the structure and accessory structure located at: PARCEL #006-119-29-0-20-13-003-00-0 LEGALLY DESCRIBED AS R05-RAILROAD ADDITION, LOTS 11, 13 & 15, BLK 4 IN BOURBON COUNTY, IN THE CITY OF FORT SCOTT, KANSAS, OTHERWISE KNOWN AS [402 N. SHUTE], FORT SCOTT, KS 66701 is unsafe and dangerous.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF FORT SCOTT, KANSAS:

Section 1. That a hearing be held in the City Commissioners' Meeting Room at City Hall, 123 South Main, of the City of Fort Scott, Kansas, AUGUST 15, 2025 at 6:15 PM. for the purpose of hearing evidence to be submitted by the Fire Chief and other representatives of said City with reference to the physical condition of the structure (and accessory structure) located on: PARCEL #006-119-29-0-20-13-003-00-0 LEGALLY DESCRIBED AS R05-RAILROAD ADDITION, LOTS 11, 13 & 15, BLK 4 IN BOURBON COUNTY, IN THE CITY OF FORT SCOTT, KANSAS, OTHERWISE KNOWN AS [402 N. SHUTE], FORT SCOTT, KS 66701 alleged to be unsafe and dangerous.

Section 2. The owner(s), his or their agent(s), any lienholders of record, and any occupant of such structure (and accessory structure) and any other person having an interest in said structure (and accessory structure) may appear at said hearing and show cause why such structure and accessory structure should not be condemned and ordered repair or demolished.

Section 3. This resolution shall be published once each week for two consecutive weeks on the same day of each week. At least 30 days shall elapse between the last publication and the date set for the hearing and a copy of said resolution shall be mailed by certified mail within three (3) days after its first publication to each such owner, agent, lienholders and occupant at his or its last known place of residence and shall be marked "delivered to the addressee only"; provided that if the owner is a resident of Bourbon County, Kansas, the resolution shall be personally served within five (5) days on such owner or delivered to his or their last known address in lieu of mailing the same, and in this case, at least one week shall elapse between the service on such owner and the date set for the hearing.

Section 4. If the governing body of the city at said hearing shall find that such structure (and accessory structure) is unsafe and dangerous, said governing body will by resolution direct the structure to be repaired or removed and the premises made safe and secure pursuant to said Ordinance No. 3507 and 3500 and the provisions of K.S.A. 12-1750 to 12-1756 inclusive, as amended. Such resolution shall be published in the official City paper and a copy mailed to the owner(s), agent(s), lienholder(s) of record and occupant and other persons having an interest in the structure (and accessory structure) in the same manner provided for in the notice of hearing.

Section 5. This resolution shall be in full force and effect

Kan. Supreme court upholds decision on Mitchell's sentence

A decision on the sentence for a Fort Scott man convicted of murdering his mother and stepfather was upheld by the Kansas Supreme Court.

In a unanimous decision written by Justice K.J. Wall, the Supreme Court affirmed the consecutive hard 50 life sentences imposed on Dawson James Mitchell for the premeditated murders of his mother and stepfather.

On an appeal submitted without oral argument, Mitchell argued the Bourbon County District Court should have imposed hard 25 sentences based on his severe mental illness, troubled upbringing, and accepting responsibility. He also argued the sentences should run concurrently rather than consecutively.

The Court held that while the district court acknowledged Mitchell's mitigating evidence, it reasonably concluded the factors did not constitute "substantial and compelling reasons" to deviate from hard 50 sentences given the premeditated, brutal nature of the crimes. The Court also concluded that the district court did not abuse its discretion in imposing consecutive sentences because Mitchell killed two people.

Mitchell was sentenced on May 2, 2024. In November 2023, Mitchell pleaded guilty to two counts of off-grid person felonies of murder in the first degree premeditated, for the Dec. 21, 2021 death of his mother, Melissa Havs-Mitchell and stepfather Leonard Zimmerman in a residence in the 400 block of Main Street.

The current term for Milburn-Kee, who is fulfilling the first two years of Kruger's term, will end in January 2027. Milburn-Kee is the sole candidate for the District 5 seat.

'Assuming she's going to get that," Bower said. "

The District 5 seat will be for a three-year term ending in 2029. There is also one candidate for the District 4 position, who would take office in January and serve through 2027.

Bowers said Beerbower's term is for four years, so he will be able to run again in the fall of 2028. She said since Whisenhunt's resignation occurred before May of the first two years of his



term, Tran is finishing out two years of Whisenhunt's term, which ends in 2027.

'When Commissioner Milburn transitions to position 5, we will do the same and will appoint out of old District 3, following the rules, it will be for two years," Bowers said.

Tran said one of his concerns is maintaining continuity on the commission as past commissioners have resigned and new commissioners taken their seats.

"Whenever you're downrange, one of the things that happens is when you switch out people too quickly, you lose a lot of historical knowledge, you lose your momentum," he said. "When I'm looking at this, this body of government has gone through a lot of ups and downs and turmoil, people coming and going."

Tran said he would like for commissioners to provide an "opportunity to keep at least one person in there a longer term, to build that continuity."

"If we start cutting people's legs out from under them, that's not going to do us, and by us I mean the county, any service," he said.

Tran said he was serv-

ing in just his second week, and there has been a "huge learning curve." "This is not a responsibil-

ity I personally take lightly," he said. Tran said he recommends

that Milburn-Kee's term be the longer term as "she has the continuity."

"That may be political suicide, but that's my take," he said.

Beerbower said he understood Tran's points, but he looks at the situation from the opposite view.

"I'm also looking at the other candidate and they're both running in an election," Beerbower said. "They're both running for four years and one is getting their feet cut out from under them."

Beerbower said by January, when new commissioners are sworn in, Milburn-Kee and the other commissioners will be 'quite seasoned."

"We've kind of had baptism by fire since January,"

Jean Tucker, a citizen in attendance, asked if Milburn-Kee can campaign for one district while serving in another district.

"Otherwise, she'd have to resign before the primary or the election," Tucker said. "Which mean she'd have to be replaced between then and January.

Bowers said Milburn-Kee will serve in her current seat until she is sworn into her new role.

When Beerbower asked about a time frame for commissioners to decide the terms, Walker said the decision "should have been done a long time ago," before candidates ran for election.

There was some discussion on whether Milburn-Kee could vote on the term limits. Beerbower said she would have to abstain.

In response to a question from citizen Tim Emerson, Beerbower said he was elected for a four-year term ending in 2028. Tran said his term also ends in 2028.

"There are two positions that are going to be removed," Tran said. "I'm not going to say we're going to be in, that would be presumptuous. Two bodies are definitely going to come out, leaving whoever is here to basically hold down the fort and keep the continu-
