# Brown County commission approves two new members for Planning Commission

The Brown County commission voted unanimously to approve two new members for the Brown County Planning Commission during Monday morning's meeting.

These two new members entering into the planning commission will be Annette Hoskins and Wesley Selland. These two will replace current members Rex Lockwood and Bill Seckler, who

will be leaving the positions once Hoskins and Selland take over.

Emergency Coordinator and Brown County Landfill Director Don Pounds met with the commission members regarding the current fire resolution, which Pounds commented that he received "unhappy calls" from the local fire chiefs. Pounds stated that the fire chiefs expressed frustration with the current fire resolution and that he would be receiving more phone calls about the issue if the current

resolution was left in place.

The current fire resolution includes that Brown County citizens who wanted to burn had to contact one of the local fire chiefs, who then would contact the Sheriff's Office to sign for burn authorization. The fire chiefs voiced their opposition to the current resolution due to citizens not able to reach out to the fire chiefs directly and also the chiefs expressing privacy concerns with their phone numbers being given out without their

knowledge, as well as the overall inefficiency of the resolution. Pounds also explained that the current resolution includes that if fire chiefs needed reimbursement for fire equipment used for fire situations, they would also need to contact the Sheriff's Office, including what was used and overall cost.

Commenting on the fire resolution that was passed during March 3lst county meeting, Commissioner Lucas Heinen lamented the commission's

decision approving the current fire resolution and that the resolution was approved too fast to fix a previous issue as quickly as possible but ended up creating a new problem in the process.

"We solved one problem and created another," Heinen said. "We had the best of intentions but the results weren't quite what we were after."

Both Heinen and Lehmkuhl agreed that calling dispatch about fires being started was necessary. In the end, Heinen opted to table the discussion about the fire resolution in a future meeting.

Below are some other items that were discussed during the meeting:

- All commissioners voted to approve occupational licenses for the Mission Lake Country Club in Horton and The Country Cabin in Hiawatha.
- All commissioners voted to approve the Brown County Landfill Report and a Solid Waste hauling agreement.
