100 Years Ago June 4, 1925

Another Home Makers Club was organized in the community southeast of Severance, last Tuesday, May 26. The Club is to be known as the Happy Hour Club. The purpose of the club is not only to take advantage of the social times but also to receive the benefits of the program prepared for the Home Makers Clubs by the Extension Dept. of the State Agricultural College. This is the seventh Home Makers Club in the county, the list includes the Sunflower Club in Marion township, the Get-Together Club near Doniphan, the Mt. Vernon Community Club south of Denton, the Oakland Community Club south of Bendena, the Golden Rule Club southwest of Bendena, the Ma-Da-Sa Club near Bendena, and the Happy Hour Club between Severance and Bendena.

The German Lutheran Church about seven miles southeast of Troy, was struck by lightning Tuesday night during the storm and burned to the ground, with \$3,500 being the extent of the insurance carried on the building.

From about one o'clock a.m. to about 5:30, six inches of rain fell here at Troy. The heavy fall of water is the greatest in many years. The farmers all over the county are damaged greatly by the fall. Corn on level ground is covered up and damaged more or less whether just planted or already up. Alfalfa has badly fallen except that already cut. Wheat is also damaged some. Every stream, rivulet and creek in the county was out of its banks in placing and depositing part of its silt and mud carried by the hillside wash into the current. Livestock was drowned. The Burlington railroad bridge washed out on Independence Creek. The Grand Island trains were several hours late yesterday owing to washouts on tracks and other damage near Moray.

There were one hundred and nine high school graduates in Doniphan County this year. Last year there were one hundred and twenty.

40 Years Ago June 6, 1985

Dancer, a four-month-old male African lion cub lives on a farm south of Highland with the Walton family, Troy, Tina, and Tia. The cub was three months old and weighed 15 pounds when the Waltons got him and he now weighs 40 pounds and is the size of a cocker spaniel, Mary Winder wrote. The Walton "family" also includes a ferret, horses, two dogs, and a sheep.

A memorial scholarship will be dedicated to John F. Halling, Midway superintendent Bob Albers announced. "John was an avid supporter of all the area schools," he said.

125 Years Ago, June 7, 1900

Walter Broyles, a bright youth of Severance who is studying law at K.U. won his first case. He was counsel for a man who was arrested for disturbing the peace at Severance.

Shot-in-the-head Andy Dupont has left White Cloud and has gone to Kansas City to live off his wife. As soon as he got home he commenced practicing for his profession - prize fighting - by beating her. She has had him arrested and charges that he is of unsound mind. There must be something in the charge. The bullet which passed through his brains lodging inside the skull is still weighing on his mind.

H. D. Guthrie of near Highland Station is a relative of Dr. Samuel Guthrie, the discoverer of chloroform.

John Bruner left yesterday afternoon for Excelsior Springs. He believes that a 3-weeks' sojourn there will help his rheumatism.

The new bank will be located in J. L. Allen's law office while he moves his office into the room used by Max Lisitzky and the latter moves one door farther west.

Highland's credited population is 780 but within 100 yards of the city's boundaries are over 50 inhabitants which are really a part of the town. This raises the actual population to 830. A railroad and an enlarged college would make it 1000 within one year.

Will Foust, injured in a runaway last week, is very much better and able to walk about.

The farmers are somewhat uneasy over the discovery of wheat lice. They are small green bugs and are found in great number, sometimes twenty or thirty to a stalk, in the wheat fields. They live by extracting sustenance from the growing wheat kernels.

C. G. Phelps drove N. A. Stull's horse to Troy one day last week but failed to drive him back home. When on his way home and driving along the railroad track south of the Station, an approaching train so frightened the horse that he fell to the earth dead. This is the second instance of a train scaring Highland horses to death.

100 Years Ago, June 4, 1925

Recent new owners of Chevrolet cars are the following: touring cars - Lee Harness, Charles Harness, Avery Peek, George Dorrell; coach - B. G. Whittaker. All the cars were bought in Highland.

LaVerne Wolff and Mary Gilmore, two popular students of the College, were married at the Christian parsonage in Highland last Friday, May 29 at 3 o'clock. Friday evening the young couple gave an informal dance in Severance. They went to Atchison for a short wedding trip and from there to Centralia, Kan., for a visit with Mr. Wolff's parents. Their plans for the future have not yet been determined. Mary is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ezra Gilmore of this community.

College activities for the year were brought to an end by the sixty-seventh annual commencement exercise held in the auditorium Tuesday evening, June 2. A goodly crowd of relatives and friends of the graduates came to see the fourteen graduates given final recognition for their two years of faithful work.

Mrs. W. E. Simmons died in St. Joseph Monday morning. She was the mother of Mrs. J. E. Shaffer of Highland and J. W. Simmons of White Cloud.

Roy Fink, a farmhand employed by Lonnie Droz, a farmer who lives north of Wathena, is in the county jail at Troy charged with assault with intent to kill following the shooting Sunday of William Stanley, a farmer who lives across the street from Droz. Stanley is in a St. Joseph hospital and is reported not to be seriously injured. It is alleged that family troubles prompted the shooting, which was done with a shotgun.

But, if a majority of eligible voters approve the proposal, the consolidation will not be "temporary." This one fact was stressed last Tuesday evening, May 25, during a public hearing at the Wathena school. It followed a similar hearing the previous evening at the Elwood school.

The City of Troy continues to make good use of available grant funding to improve its infrastructure. Already in progress is a \$433,000 water main project along Locust St. Next on the agenda is a public hearing on June 8 at City Hall to outline plans for proposed sanitary sewer improvements through the small cities Community Development Block Grant funding by the state Department of Commerce.
