Troy First Graders Plant a Mini-Prairie

Powered by their own enthusiasm and led by some caring adults, a group of Troy Elementary School first graders planted native prairie wildflower plants at the Troy Community Park on Sept. 17. The project was made possible through the Plant A Prairie program sponsored by the Kansas Native Plant Society.

"I thought it went really well!" says Maggie Michalak, first grade teacher at Troy. "The students had a good time. They liked getting their hands dirty, and they were really excited to get to do the planting themselves. It may have been the first time some had ever been gardening.'

Selena Smith of rural Fanning, who is a Master Gardener and a member of the Troy Community Park Committee, organized the project.

"Selena contacted our principal, Allisha Engemann, about this program at the end of last school year, and Allisha then asked if I wanted to do it with my first grade students. I said, 'Yes!'" explains Maggie. "Then, Selena got back in touch with me at the beginning of this school year to work out the details."

After receiving the green light last spring to go ahead with carrying out the program, Selena moved forward with the plans.

"I'd read about the Plant A Prairie program before and thought it would be a neat project to get the kids out-

side and in nature, and to teach them about native plants," says Selena. "There was an application I filled out in the spring and shortly after was approved."

The Kansas Native Plant Society (KNPS) website includes information about this program.

"Each Plant A Prairie garden includes 32 live plants (8 species) enough for an 8 foot by 10 foot classroom garden—along with a native plant ID field guide, planting instructions, a Plant A Prairie garden sign, links to teaching resources, and expert advice via phone or email," the website states. "Kansas teachers K-12 and leaders of youth organizations are eligible to apply. The number of kits is limited.'

"Students will enjoy the hands-on experience of planting and tending their mini-prairie," the website continues. "They can learn the basics of plant biology and prairie ecology. And, the completed garden helps preserve our natural heritage by providing a way station for bees, butterflies and

There is no cost to the participants in the Plant A Prairie program. The plants are provided for free and are hand-selected to match local growing conditions.

"Funding for Plant A Prairie is provided by the Gary and June Kliesen Memorial Fund," the website mate-

Floyd McElwain of St. Joseph. who owns the building at 105 E. St. Joseph Street in Wathena where he maintains an office for his business, McElwain Sprayers, LLC, and Mike Gabriel of Wathena organized the project. Both men emphasize that they had plenty of help with the project from various businesses,

entities, and individuals. The flagpole project actually began last fall when Gabriel shared his idea of installing a flagpole for an American flag in Wathena with McElwain.

Wathena's Main Street Mural on Display

The American Legion Post #161 Auxialiary is excited to announce that they were recently awarded a grant from the Kansas Department of Commerce, office of Rural Prosperity to commission a mural on Main Street, Wathena to tell our towns history and encourage people to visit.

According to the State's press release on Sept.17th, 2025, Lieutenant Governor and Secretary of Commerce David Toland announced that the agency has awarded \$75,000 in Rural Mural funding to support public art projects in rural communities across the state.

"Our rural communities are the backbone of what makes our state so great — they're rich in culture, resilience and unique identity," Lieutenant Governor and Secretary of Commerce David Toland said. Troy Man Sentenced for Sexual Battery

Hunter Artman, a 24-year-old man from Troy, was sentenced to six months in jail after pleading no contest to a misdemeanor charge of sexual battery. The sentencing took place in Doniphan County District Court on Thursday, September 25,

The charge stems from an incident in April 2019, where Artman was accused of sexually assaulting a woman. He was formally charged in February 2023 after an investigation by the Doniphan County Sheriff's Office.

As part of a plea deal, a more serious felony rape charge was dismissed. Following the hearing, Artman was ordered to report to the Doniphan County Jail to begin serving his sentence.
