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“I’m super excited to go home,” said Hunter, whose hometown is Boynton Beach, Florida. “It means a lot that

they gave up so much. It means they believe in me.”
Meanwhile, Colorado quarterback Shedeur Sanders was still on the board halfway through the first round, even though some draft analysts had him rated higher than Ward.

The New York Giants chose Penn State edge rusher Abdul Carter with the No. 3 pick, bolstering an already strong pass rush. Carter led the country with 23 1/2 tackles for loss and had 12 sacks last season.
The New England Patriots took LSU left tackle

Will Campbell with the fourth pick, giving quarterback Drake Maye more protection.
Campbell broke down in tears on stage, saying: “I’m gonna fight and die to protect him.”
Michigan defensive tackle Mason Graham went fifth to Cleveland.

Boise State running back Ashton Jeanty was picked at No. 6 by the Las Vegas Raiders.
The New York Jets selected Missouri offensive tackle Armand Membou with the seventh pick. Arizona wide receiver Tetairoa McMillan went to the Carolina

Panthers with the No. 8 pick.
The New Orleans Saints chose Texas offensive tackle Kelvin Banks Jr. at No. 9. Michigan’s Colston Loveland became the first tight end off the board when the Chicago Bears selected him at No. 10.

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The Firebirds got a quality start from senior pitcher Cayman Cook, who relied on help from his defense to throw seven innings of one-run baseball. Cook allowed five hits and struck out four batters while not allowing any free passes.
“He attacked the zone, had multiple pitches that were working,” head coach Mike Hill said. “I thought he got some weak contact early and we played defense behind him.”
Hill said that it was important for Cook to go as long into the game as

he could, and added that the complete game was important for his confidence moving forward.
“(I’m) really happy for him,” he said. “He’s a very, very hard worker. It’s important to him, and when that’s the case, you like to see kids like that have success.”
Added Cook: “I just got to keep doing what I did today, be more consistent. This is definitely the best I’ve done all season so I just need to be more consistent in the future.”
Not only did Cook limit the St. James Academy offense, but he did it in an efficient manner, throwing 87 total pitches, which is what Hill says allowed for Cook to stay in the game when the seventh inning came around.

Free State had a strong start on both sides as Cook retired the side in order in the top of the first, while the offense scored three runs in the home half of the frame. Ryker Mahnke hit a single to start the inning, and Cole Wright followed with a double to put runners on second and third with no outs. An RBI single by Ben Graves and a sacrifice fly by Finn Moore scored the first two runs, while Owen Lester drove in Graves with another RBI single before the inning ended.
“Baseball is a lot easier when you’re playing with a lead, and to get three in the first, I thought was important,” Hill said. “It allowed Cayman to settle in even though he had a good top of the first.”

In the second inning, Cook retired the side in order once again, finishing with a strikeout, while the Firebird offense struggled to build on its first-inning success and didn’t get anyone on base.
The Thunder began the third inning with a single for its first baserunner before Cook minimized the damage with a double play and a strikeout.
The Firebirds capitalized on offense and added to their lead with a two-RBI double by catcher Andrew Zimmerschied to score Graves and Moore and make it 5-0 before a groundout and a strikeout ended the inning.
Cook continued his efficient showcase on the mound by retiring the side in the top of the fourth,

finishing the inning with a pair of groundouts. Boston Baker began the bottom of the fourth with a single for Free State before a walk put Charlie Peters on base. After a lineout and a walk to load the bases, Graves scored Baker with a sacrifice fly for the lone run of the inning.
St. James Academy began the fifth inning in identical fashion to the third with a single, before Free State recorded a fielder’s choice for the first out. Cook relied on his defense, inducing two more fielder’s choices to leave the Thunder scoreless.
Moore led off the bottom of the fifth with a single but was stranded at second after a groundout and a pair of strikeouts. The Firebirds kept the

Thunder scoreless in the top of the sixth, retiring the side with a groundout, strikeout, and flyout.
After a scoreless bottom of the sixth inning, Free State needed three outs to finish the win. The inning started with a hit and an error that ultimately turned into a run thanks to an RBI single by Brogan Jaworski.
Following a mound visit, Cook induced two lineouts and a strikeout to finish off the complete game and secure the win.
Cook said the message during the mound visit was “You got this, just breathe, calm down.”
Free State will continue the River City Baseball Festival today afternoon, hosting Oklahoma’s Edmond-Deer Creek at 3:45 p.m.

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To start the game, the Antlers scored the opening run on an RBI single with one out. The Lions got two outs right after, including a strikeout from pitcher Brice Schwada for the third out.
The Antlers’ lead didn’t stay long, with the Lions getting a run of their own in the bottom of the first. First baseman Hudson Hardesty hit a leadoff single but was caught stealing second base in the following at-bat, which resulted in a strikeout.

Third baseman Ethan Curry and right fielder Brady Wollesen hit back-to-back singles, the latter bringing in the Lions’ first run. A groundout in the next at-bat ended the inning.
Lawrence kept Deer Creek from regaining the lead with three outs. The Lions picked off a runner in a pickle, and Schwada threw his second strikeout to close the half-inning. On offense, the Lions recorded a single from center fielder Josh Galbreath and a walk from designated hitter Nate Kress, but Kress was ruled out for offensive interference, which closed the inning.

“It can’t happen,” Green said of the missed opportunity to potentially go ahead with the two runners on base. “It’s about instinct, baseball IQ.”
Both teams retired the side within three at-bats, although Hardesty was able to reach first on an error to start the bottom of the third. He was later caught stealing, which was followed by a strikeout for the third out.
The fourth inning was where the Antlers built their lead for good. With two outs, they hit three singles with a walk and an error before Ethan Curry recorded the final out with a force out at third. The Lions put two

runners on base in the bottom of the fourth but weren’t able to bring either home.
“We have a small margin for error, and an inning like that is difficult for us to overcome,” Green said. “For us to win games, we have to be clean. We cannot give people four, five, six outs in an inning.”
A triple in the fifth inning brought in the Antlers’ sixth run, but the Lions closed the inning with three straight outs.
Lawrence started the bottom of the fifth with two outs but found some life with a single from left fielder Tristan Prier and a walk by Curry. The

pair advanced a base on a passed ball during the next at-bat, and Wollesen drove them home with a two-RBI single to center field. Shortstop Logan Harris hit a single as Wollesen advanced to third, and second baseman Logan Sheldon walked to load the bases. A strikeout after a pitching change prevented the Lions from clawing back into the game and closed the fifth.
Sheldon relieved Schwada in the sixth inning, and the Antlers finished with one runner on base from a walk. The Lions managed a double at the plate but couldn’t get anyone else on base.

The game was critical for the relievers. As both teams started to gain some ground against the starters, they switched to their relievers, who changed the pace of the pitching and kept the batters off balance.
“I’m proud of what Logan Sheldon did, but they threw their Logan Sheldon against us,” Green said.
Deer Creek hit two singles in the top of the seventh before recording the third out, and Lawrence managed only a single in the bottom of the seventh before the final out of the game.
