Commission 'bares' down to pass pub lic nudity ban

Linn County commissioners passed a resolution banning public nudity at its Sept. 2 weekly meeting, delayed a day for the governmental Labor Day

Resolution No. 2025-16, enacted on a 2-0 vote with Alison Hamilton not present, forbids nudity on public property or outside the home on private property when visible to others.

The resolution defines nudity as genital or anal exposure, as well as exposure below a horizontal line crossing the top of the female areola at its highest point with less than a

Property taxes and how they work

In Kansas, there is a definitive process for determining what the property taxes are on any given piece of property.

Did you know that according to SmartAsset.com Linn County has the second lowest property tax average in the entire

According to information available on their website, the average property tax rate in Linn County is 1.06 percent and we are beat out only by Nemaha County which has a similar population and an average rate of 1.01

Neighboring counties all

have higher average rates, such as:

Miami County - 1.21 percent

Bourbon County - 1.77

Linn County has the second lowest property tax average in the entire state

Johnson County -1.17 percent

Anderson County – 1.61 percent

According to the website, the median home value in Linn County is \$148,200, which at the rate of 1.06 percent, calculates to a median property tax payment of \$1,569.

In Johnson County, however, the median home value is much higher, at \$343,300 which at their rate of 1.17 percent calculates to a median tax payment of \$4,000.

This uses a formula of median tax payment /median home value x 100 to determine the average effective tax rate percentage or MTP/MHVx-100=AETRP.

Now that said, in determining the property taxes, there are several steps involved.

First, the county appraiser has to determine the appraised value of the property. What that means is starting on Jan. 1 each year, the Appraiser's Office is required to assign a fair market value to your property. To do that they can use a sales comparison approach in which they

Pleasanton Fire Department personnel hiring questioned

What started out as a department update from Pleasanton Fire Chief Jeff Wisdom, turned into a showdown between councilmembers and the mayor in who was hired as volunteer firefighters in Pleasanton.

Wisdom informed the council he was beginning training for new firefighters September through December and said he is seeking credentials with radio I.D.s for volunteers.

He then asked that the council agree to move the automatic aid agreement back to a five-mile radius that was initially set up by former Fire Chief Rob

He said they could possibly get Pleasanton into a mutual aid agreement only and the city still gets automatic aid from the county; either way it won't affect the county's ISO status.

Mayor Mathew Young reiterated with any possible change to mutual aid for the department within five miles radius that there would still be automatic aid for structure fires.

The change would reduce the area Station 920 to a five-mile radius.

Wisdom said the reason behind the change would be to lessen the number of calls the city department would have to respond to while they are trying get equipment and training up to par.

"There would be less calls to respond to," he said, "but potentially more personnel to respond to calls."

Councilwoman Ro-

chelle Schreckhise then questioned Wisdom on why volunteer firefighter Dennis Mitchel and Jake Mattingley weren't hired and Wisdom said he had no problem with either and was comfortable with their experience in emergency situations.

After further discussion on the qualifications of both applicants, Mayor Mathew Young said, "That is an appointment by the mayor; I don't feel comfortable with the appointment."

Portmann said the chief needs more firefighters and wondered why the mayor was answering the question of hiring for Wisdom.

Schreckhise then said that she would recommend hiring Mitchell. Young said, "Noted." SEE FIRE PERSONNEL, A6
