Traffic-flow signage at two intersections along La Cygne's Lincoln Avenue will see changes effective

At its regular meeting last Wednesday, the council voted 4-0--with Ed Smith not present--to accept the recommendation by Zach Mathies, police chief, at Lincoln intersections with 5th and

At 5th Street, a yield sign will be replaced with a stop sign, and at 6th Street, Lincoln's east/west stop signs will be removed altogether, transforming the current four-way stop there to a two-way.
