Pleasanton council votes 2-2 on RNR, budget

The Pleasanton City Council met on Monday, Sept. 15, and began the meeting with a hearing on the revenue neutral rate (RNR) followed by the budget hearing.

With no one in the audience coming forward to speak on either, the hearings were opened and closed without incident and Mayor Mathew Young then asked for a motion to approve Resolution 462 regarding the exceedance of the revenue neutral rate by 74.795 mills. Council member Angelina Randall made that motion and it was seconded by council member Aaron Portmann.

That motion failed to carry on a 2-2 vote and Mayor Mathew Young voted yes to break the tie. Randall then made a motion to accept the 2026 budget as presented and that motion was also seconded by Portmann and a roll call vote on the motion came down to a 2-2 result, as well.

Following the failed vote, a second motion was made to adopt the 2026 budget by Portmann with Randall seconding the motion and a discussion followed in which Council member Bill Skipper stated he could "not in good faith accept a budget with the police department being what it is when the ad valorem income is going to be \$448,538."

Council member Rochelle Schreckhise stated
