that the previous Friday the county had taken possession of the JCB Hydradig it purchased earlier this year and that going forward Road and Bridge would be using the versatile machine extensively to mow brush.

He told the commissioners that the Hydradig "looks really nice.

Finally, Christy made Domann aware of a letter he had received regarding the status of the old wood-plank bridge located along Oak Road just north of Fifth Street, southwest of Williamstown. A brief discussion followed, during which the Public Works director talked about KDOT's bridge inspection schedule and the girders that had been installed to shore up the bridge so that it could potentially support heavier vehicles and, in particular, at least some school buses.

The bridge currently has a weight limit of six tons.

Christy directed the Public Works director to make the reclassification of the bridge a high priority.

In other business during the board's weekly meeting at the courthouse in Oskaloosa, County Appraiser Janet Allen reported that her office had received 116 informal appeals from property owners following the mailing of this year's valuation notices for real property. She said that figure represented less than 1% of the total number of parcels in the county, 15,508.

Allen said 78% of the appeals had already been dealt with by her office.

Asked by Walbridge if the appeals were justified, Allen replied by saying some of them were and some of them weren't. She mentioned the identification of mold in some structures in explaining her answer.

In response to a question posed by Christy, Allen said one of the appeals might end up going before the state Board of Tax Appeals.

Historical society budget

Representing the Jefferson County Historical Society, Greg Noll, the president of the organization, and Clifford Burk, the treasurer, were on hand for the meeting to formally present the historical society's budget request for 2026 to the board.

Noll told Christy, Malm, and Walbridge that although the historical society thrives on the money it gets from the county each year, it still struggles "to

the cost to insure the buildings at Old Jefferson Town in Oskaloosa, and added that it also has been facing higher utility costs.

Noll also mentioned the removal of the stately cottonwood trees that had stood relatively close to the John Steuart Curry Boyhood Home and Museum, the Reynolds Building, the Tibbott Building, the Kilgour-Plum Grove Building and Edmonds Chapel, a project that was undertaken to reduce the chances of these structures being damaged by falling limbs and branches.

He reported that he and Burk had "inherited" a maintenance problem in OJT's historic buildings when they became JCHS officers at the start of the year, and said the two of them had been fixing up things in need of repair. He described the maintenance of the buildings and the grounds encompassing them as a "non-ending job."

Walbridge wondered whether or not the historical society could obtain insurance coverage at a lower cost through the Kansas County Association Multiline Pool. County Counselor Josh Nev said he would have to look into the matter but ventured to say KCAMP would probably balk at the proposal unless the buildings were included in a formal trust held by the county or the county had a hand in the determination of the JCHS's officers and board members.

Nev took advantage of the opportunity to mention the Pat Roberts pocket museum near the west entrance to the courthouse, which prompted Noll to tell him and the commissioners that the historical society would eventually like to house the museum at OJT. He said the organization wants to add another building to the pioneer village at some point and use it to display various items that can't be properly displayed now because of a lack of space. The museum could be put there, he noted.

The historical society is asking the county for \$20,900. Last year it wanted \$20,895 from the county.

Law enforcement center

Asked by Christy about the status of the planned expansion of the Law Enforcement Center in Oskaloosa, Sheriff Jeff Herrig said the concrete for the pad where the new generator will sit had been poured that morning and that the concrete for the slab for the addition itself should be poured "pretty soon."

On a 3-0 vote, the board authorized Christy to sign a Quit Claim deed transferring two lots from the county to the Jefferson County Land Bank. Those lots are Lot 4 in Block C of the Indian Ridge subdivision and Lot 451 in the Hickory Hills section of Lakeside Village.

The deed was brought forward by Community Development Director Stephan Metzger.

It was the consensus of the board that a hearing be scheduled for Monday, May 12 to consider a petition to vacate the setbacks identified on the plat for a piece of property located at 11091 46th Street, Perry.

In presenting the petition to the commissioners for their consideration, Metzger said the vacation of the setbacks would eliminate the need for the petitioners, Daniel and Linda Foltz, to have to replat the property sometime in the future.

The property is zoned Suburban Residential.

Motorcycle Awareness Month

Christy indicated to those present that as a motorcyclist, he was in favor of the proclamation, and he suggested that County Counselor-designate Jonathan Ehrlich, who wasn't present, also would be in favor of it, implying that he, too, likes to ride a bike every now and then

The proclamation read as follows:

Whereas, motorcycle riding has become a popular form of transportation and recreation for a vast and growing number of people in the state of Kansas; and

"Whereas, there is a growing need to promote safety for motorcyclists and cooperation among drivers of all motor vehicles on the road; and

Whereas, it is especially important that drivers be aware of motorcycles and give them our space and respect on our streets and highways; and

"Whereas, during the month of May, all streets and highway users should unite in the safety of motorcyclists, striving to share the roadways in the state of Kansas. 'Now, therefore, I David Christy, county commissioner of Jefferson County, do hereby proclaim May 2025 as Motorcycle Awareness Month in Jefferson County, Kansas. "I urge all citizens to join in this observation."
