Delong comes back from injury to sweep No. 1 singles as Bluestreaks claim 3rd at tennis meet

TOWANDA — Recovery time from an injury is possibly the longest period of an athlete's life. Bluestreak freshman Jack DeLong knows this too well, as he has been sidelined for a chunk of the tennis season with a knee injury.

But last Thursday, the Neodesha tennis team competed at Circle High School here and DeLong returned to his game — No. 1 singles — to go undefeated in three matches, and help the Bluestreaks to a first-place team finish.

The 'Streaks tandem of J'Vonte White and Lauklon Roebuck also placed first with a 3-0 mark in No. 2 doubles, while Tayte Leck and Kylan Turner placed third playing No. 1 doubles.

"For the past few weeks Jack has been back to playing singles, which had always been his game, pre-injury," noted Head Coach Jason DeLong.

"Match after match, it's been hard for Jack to watch his opponent carry off the game balls to the winners' table, reporting the score.

"Jack has felt defeated because the scores clearly show he has lost; but, he's making gains and personal wins during most of his matches."

In that No. 1 spot DeLong plays primarily juniors or seniors; his coach commented that those upperclassmen "might be the games' winners, but Jack gives it all he's got."

"Playing opponents at or above his skill level is making him a more finessed player,"

While those were the only individuals able to crack the top six in the rugged invitational, Altoona-Midway did have personal best times turned in by six other runners.

On the boys' side, also turning in PR times were:

Zach Good (29.87 in the 200 meters); Carl Anderson (32.86 in the 200); Caden Sicka (1.14.40 in the 400); and Hunter Reaves (3:22.48 in the 800).

A pair of Lady Jets also recorded PR times, both in the 800-meter run. Allie Lockhart finished with a time of 3:19.64, two spots ahead of Emily Burch, who was clocked at 3:2488.

"Abbey's Editorial Cartoon was excellent. She has been competing in this category off and on since she was a freshman, but she's developed her cartooning over the last four years with 'Abbey's Animals'. I'm proud of how far they all have come,"

Botts commented that Neodesha competed in a tough region, so even qualifying at regionals is an honor, and a number of NHS students performed well. Regional competition combines Classes 3A-4A, putting Neodesha in with mostly 4A and suburban 3A schools.

"They should be very proud of qualifying," Botts said.
