

care appointments, employment and even to drop students off at school. The Commissioners collectively thanked them for their hard work and continued dedication.

Moving on, the Commissioners accepted the Consent Agenda as it was presented and began with the evening's Items for Commission Action, which approved the following items:

 A proclamation signed by Mayor Smith proclaiming August 21, 2025 as National Senior Citizens

• The issuance of Ordinance No. 4492, amending City code section 42-261 of the Flood Plain Ordinance. Assistant City Manager David Cowan spoke on this, stating that staff had been in talks with a Certified Floodplain manager who had reviewed the City's floodplain regulations and had found an error in the elevation requirements for flood protection. In the City Code Section 42-161, Division 4, Subsection (4)(d), code states that elevation of one foot above Base Flood Elevation is required, while Sections 42-262(1) (a) and 42-263(2)(d) require a minimum of two feet above Base Flood Elevation. In order to resolve the mixup, the Citry is amending Section 42-261(4)(e) to require all new or replacement water supply and sanitary sewage systems be elevated a minimum of two feet above the Base Flood Elevation, aligning all the sections of City Code.

• Setting the date of October 22 as the date for a public hearing to consider the condemnation of 401 South 2nd Street as dangerous and unsafe. On May 3, the structure at this address was involved in a fire that created extensive damage to the second floor and water damage throughout the

• Approval of a lease agreement with South Kansas & Oklahoma Railroad for the purpose of a walking trail. The agreement would give the City a lease on the walking trail that goes underneath the railroad trestle that goes over the Verdigris River.

• Approval of a signage plan and installation of said signs along the Indy Trails System. Brittney Holum, Community Foundation for Independence's Rural Champion, is spearheading the project. Through a grant provided by the Kansas Department of Commerce, Holum created and curated the trail system, which leads from the park, along the old Interurban track base, around the Central Park Sports Complex and ending back at the Central Park Complex after turning at the Pine Street Dam and is called the Verdigris Vista Trail. The 2.4-mile trail is fully constructed and is in the final stages before it is ready to be open to the public. Holum updated the Commission on the progress of the project, sharing that SKOL has to finish installing a safety barrier under the trellis, the signage needs to be designed and placed, a bit more trail "grooming" needs to be completed and a gate will be installed at one access point along Wells Drive to inhibit vehicles from traversing the walking trail.

 Approval of a Downtown Independence Building Grant for 113 West Myrtle Street in the amount of \$24,561.03. Indepen-

dence Housing Authority Director April Nutt spoke on the matter, stating that she was visiting with the owner, walking through the building where eleven apartments will be going in when she had noticed there was water damage. The owner, too, had noticed the damage and had originally intended to replace the roof, tuck point the exterior and replace windows and exterior doors. Now that the roof is leaking, Nutt explained, the urgency has kicked in and the owner wants to get the roof repaired as soon as possible before any further damage to the property is incurred. • Authorizing the Mayor to sign a

letter to commit four vacant Cityowned lots for a federal Affordable Housing Program grant application. Again, April Nutt address the Commissioners and stated that the Independence Housing Authority Board of Directors had approved submission of federal Home Loan Bank Affordable Housing Program grant application in the amount of \$1.5 million in partnership with Trident 3D Homes for the possible construction of 40 single-family homes on infill lots owned by the Independence Land Bank. Nutt expressed that the monies would be used for downpayment assistance on these homes, which would be available for home-buyers meeting the moderate income limits. These four lots would basically sweeten the deal when applying for the grant, as it shows initiative. These four lots are located at: 913 West Myrtle Street; 917 West Myrtle Street; 401 North 10th Street and a lot in the 800 Block of West Myrtle Street.
