County, MCAC to use the TV screen to seek business

TV documentary
will showcase
Montgomery County's
economic potential

INDEPENDENCE — Economic development officials and Montgomery County commissioners hope that putting Montgomery County's story on national television will bring future business and industry projects to the area.

Commissioners on Monday joined the Montgomery County Action Council's executive board in sharing the costs to develop a television documentary that is capable of being modified for a 30 second of 1 minute television commercial for the national television networks.

The purpose of the video project, which will be managed and produced by Viewpoint Project, is to air Montgomery County's place for further economic, business and industrial development, said county administrator Jonathan Booe.

The project will cost \$29,280, with MCAC and Montgomery County equally splitting the costs at \$14,640. Booe, along with MCAC president Joe Long, said they understood that the total cost represents the video production cost and possibly the advertisement placement on national networks, such as CNN,

Fox News, Fox Business, Discovery Life, Discovery Channel and more.

However, Booe said he would have representatives of Viewpoint Project explain the costs and obligations when he confers with them this week.

Although all three commissioners voted in favor of the project, they showed some reluctance about the overall project — questioning its purpose and its market.

Booe initially brought the issue about the TV documentary to the commission's attention at its June 23 meeting. Commissioners did not commit to the project at that meeting and asked Booe to bring more information about it to a later meeting.

Since then, the MCAC executive board conferred about the matter about being a partner in the TV documentary/commercial project. The executive board approved the project, even though executive board members shared similar concerns with commissioners about the project.

The biggest concern was whether the project would be a TV documentary or a reality show. The documentary would be educationally focused, while a reality show has a scripted storyline that attempts to draw viewers based on antagonists and protagonists.

Booe assured the commission that Viewpoint Project was a documentary company

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ICC budget to stick with neutral tax revenue

INDEPENDENCE — Additional property tax dollars are not anticipated for Independence Community College taxpayers for the 2025-26 budget year.

At Monday's ICC trustee meeting, trustees agreed to pass a resolution that declares the trustees' intent to not exceed the revenue neutral rate of 33.779 mills for the 2025-26 budget cycle, which begins July 1.

A revenue neutral rate, also known as RNR, mean that ICC will not levy any additional property tax dollars above or beyond what was raised for the 2024-25 budget cycle.

Therefore, the tax revenue is "neutral" — not more or any less when compared to the previous budget year.

ICC was able to lower its tax levy to the RNR level because of higher taxable valuations across the ICC tax district. Dr. Jonathan Sadhoo, ICC president, said ICC's predicted tax valuation is more than \$192 million — a sizable jump from the \$183.3 million that was used to prepare the college's 2024-025 budget.

With a higher tax valuation, a governmental entity is capable of decreasing its tax levy without triggering additional tax revenues. In theory, the property tax valuation process can be compared to a teeter-totter: when property valuations increase, the tax levy is capable of being lowered.

On the flip side, if property valua-

tions decrease, then the tax levy generally has to increase in order to make

up for the loss of tax revenue. For the sake of comparison, ICC's tax rate for the 2024-25 budget year was 35.415 mills. For the 2023-24 budget year, the tax levy was 37.180

Since 2020, ICC has lowered its tax rate, which is measured in terms of mills, by more than 19 percent.
