Crossland seeks bonds to build new center

More than \$4.7-million in industrial development bonds are being sought by Crossland Construction to build and equip a new office building currently under construction near the company's general offices in Columbus.

The nearly 20,000 square foot building will be used as a training center in addition to adding office space. According to the application the building will create 14-17 new jobs.

A public hearing will be held at 5:30 p.m. May 5, in the City Council chamber at City Hall to consider adoption of the ordinance authorizing issuance of the bonds. Crossland is purchasing all the bonds and will not constitute any liability to the city. The issuance of the bonds shall not directly or indirectly obligate the City of Columbus. The bonds would be

for a 10 year term.

Crossland, whose home offices are located in Columbus is Cherokee County's largest employer and is among the largest construction firms in the United States.

Columbus to review new strategic plan

of the comprehensive plan by the Columbus City Council, City Administrator Jake Letner discussed with the Council using the material developed in the comprehensive plan for a strategic plan.

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Letner asked the council to review his suggested strategic plan outline and offer their input at the next council meeting.

"A good strategic plan will look three-five years in the future and set goals that we will work towards over that time," said Letner. "Historically, the city has not operated under a strategic plan. However, I think having one could help us prioritize and accomplish meaningful projects and initiatives.

Following up with an explanation of how the information could be used, Letner said the effort put into the comprehensive plan could be reworked into a less restrictive strategic plan.

"While we did not ul-

Due to the rejection timately adopt the comprehensive plan, we got some useful data and information out of the process. I don't recommend hiring an external consultant or paying any additional money to outside vendors to assemble the strategic plan, Letner explained. can incorporate what we learned through the comp plan process into the strategic plan."

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The strategic plan should focus on things that the council has control over. Letne's recommendation is for the strategic plan to have five emphasis areas including water, sewer, and stormwater infrastructure; streets, sidewalks, and parks; public safety; economic development and housing

"These aren't the only things that the City Council and staff are responsible for, but I think these categories capture a good portion of what we do as a city," concluded Letner.

Council talks hiring environmental officer

Elimination of trash, dilapidated buildings, unkept lawns and junk cars will be the focus of a new city employee currently being sought by the City of Columbus.

A full-time code enforcement officer, hired at the department head level and reporting directly to the City Council at their meetings just as other department heads.

The full responsibilities of the new code enforcement officer will be determined once the job description is approved by the council. The City Administrator and City Clerk will draft the job description, which will then be subject to council approval. Council member Steve

Dunlap brought the unkept condition of some homes in the city to the city council suggesting the hiring of a code enforcement officer "clean up the city."

Columbus previously had a code enforcement officer who also served as an animal control officer and a police officer. Dunlap suggested that the new code enforcement officer should focus solely on city codes, rather than taking on police or animal control responsi-
