## Diane Zodrow ready to take the reins

Diane Zodrow was recently appointed as the new Decatur County Clerk by the county Republican Party after Nora Urban resigned.

"I grew up in Elm Creek, Neb., on a family farm," Zodrow said. "I moved to Germany and lived there for 28 years after having been an exchange student. I have two boys from my first marriage, Stefan and Lars. Stefan is a First Lieutenant in the German Air Force. Lars works with computer technology development in Cleveland, Ohio."

"When I met Steve (Zodrow) and we got married in 2015, my job at Baldwin Filters allowed me to work remotely for a few years until the job was outsourced and my department was dissolved. Prior to the job at Baldwin Filters, I had worked in several jobs in Germany where I had learned about accuracy, financials, international shipping, contract negotiations, accounts payable and receivable, disputes, and working independently on my own judgement."

"After my job at Baldwin Filters end-

ed, I worked for the Decatur County Treasurer's Office for several years as a clerk," Zodrow added. "I currently work as the office professional for the Decatur County Extension Office. I have worked from the ground up in every job I've had."

When asked about the appointment as County Clerk, she replied, "I'm not afraid of new things, and I can accept the challenge."

Zodrow's appointment as the new County Clerk won't be official until the official letter confirming her appointment from the Governor's office arrives.

## A change in command for Commissioners

At the Jan. 13 meeting of the Decatur County Commissioners, the commissioners voted for new officers. Justin Scott will serve as the Commission Chair for 2026, and Ben Bryan will serve as the Vice Chair.

Appraiser Mindy Harting reported, "We're looking into getting the software program Apex to draw houses properly. The current software program we have is outdated and doesn't draw well at all. The Apex program is in my other offices, and it works well. The cost would be \$1,965." The Commissioners approved the purchase of the program.

Dispatcher and Emergency Medical Technician Gracie Kettler asked, "I was wondering if I can use my sick time to cover for a few days when my son was sick. I've been here full time for almost six months." The Commissioners explained that she'd have to have worked over six months full time in order to use

her sick time.

Sheriff David Wachendorfer reported, "I have the final contract for the Digital Ticket program. County Attorney Steve Hirsch has approved it. The contract just needs signed. It will end up costing \$23,447 for the installation and first year, with an annual cost of \$3,224 each year after that. We will do training by Zoom for the program, which will save us money as compared to traveling for the training and more."

"We also have some laptops needing replaced, as the current ones we have can't be upgraded," Wachendorfer said. "We're going with refurbished laptops, as we can't afford brand new ones. I can do with five, one for each marked patrol unit. Panasonic and Gtech are the best brands. Refurbished, they are much cheaper. I'd like to go with Panasonic. The cost would be approximately \$6,995 for just the five refurbished computers alone, with the mounts being extra. I'd like to take these out

of the budget. I had budgeted about \$5,000 for new laptops."

Decatur Health Chief Financial Officer Chad Meyer reported, "About the electrical project, I wanted to see what questions or feedback you guys have. We have some processes to go through. We need to seek finance proposals to do a lease-purchase agreement on some things we need. I talked with our electrical engineer about several things. Time is of the essence to keep moving forward. The county would basically be a co-signer for the lease-purchase agreement. We hope to build the electrical system control building this summer." The Commissioners said they would like to have Hirsch talk with Mitch Walter from Gilmore and Bell about the lease-purchase agreement options.

Noxious Weed Department Supervisor Barry Quanz reported, "I have an invoice for recycling pickup repair work for \$942." The Commissioners approved the repair bill.

"I also have the annual agreement with the state for noxious weed cleanup along the highways," Quanz said. "Chemical prices haven't gone up much for the ones we've been using, and I made a purchase of some more chemicals not too long ago. I'll probably get more chemical bids in March." The Commissioners approved the agreement with the state.

Road and Bridge Department Supervisor Tracy Soderlund reported, "We're working on the landfill, fences, equipment service and inspections and more. We're preparing for the winter weather. We've got a crew doing some road work in Pleasant Valley Township. We're also working on grader blades and keeping the crew busy."

The County Commissioners meet on Tuesdays from 9 a.m. to noon. The meetings are held in the Commissioners' room on the second floor of the courthouse.

## Farmers from the area attend Cover Your Acres

The 2026 Cover Your Acres winter conference was held at The Gateway on Jan. 20 and 21. There were 11 presenters giving talks on multiple subjects. The presenters included Glenn Conover, an Extension Agricultural Economist; Jeanne Falk Jones- the K-State Northwest Area Agronomist; Lucas Haag, an Associate Professor of Agronomy and agronomist-in-charge of the Tribune Experiment Station; Sarah Lancaster, an Assistant Professor and Extension Specialist in the Kansas State University Agronomy Department; Jennifer Ifft, a Professor and Extension Specialist in Agricultural Policy; Roger McEwen, a Professor of Agricultural Law and Taxation at Washburn University School of Law; Augustine Obour, an Associate Professor of Soil Science at Kansas State University Agricultural Research Center in Hays; Daniel O'Brien, an Extension Agricultural Economist; Chip Redmond, an Assistant Scientist and Weather Data Library/Kansas Mesonet Manager at Kansas State University; Dorivar Ruiz Diaz, who specializes in soil fertility and nutrient management; and Mark Wood, an Extension Agricultural Economist with the Farm Management Association

and Extension Specialist in Northwest Kansas.

Classes were held in The Morgan Theater, the two lower-level classrooms, and the Bremer Room/upstairs meeting room. Classes covered topics of Crop Prices and Equitable Lease Arrangements; Navigating the 2026 Crop Insurance Decision, with SCO and ECO; Meeting Crop Nutrient Needs in Lean Times; Top 5 Legal Issues Farmers Don't Think Of, But Should; Considerations for Intensifying Crop Rotations; Incorporating Forages into Dryland Rotations; 2026 Grain Market Outlook and Strategies; Weather Resources and 2026 Outlook; Weed Control in Crop Rotations; Humics Role in Soil

Health; and Early Experiences with Targeted Herbicide Applications in Kansas.

Approximately 30 booths for different exhibits were set up in the Nex-Tech Communications Arena, along with three sprayers from John Deere, Case IH, and Apache, along with a Fendt Rogator 900 Series Applicator, equipped for both wet and dry applications, as well as a Case IH tractor. The brand new farm equipment costs several hundred thousand dollars for each piece of equipment.

Each day, Bryan and Wendy Rhein of Twisted Traditions catered lunch. Pam Scribner made cookies, cinnamon rolls, and cobblers.
