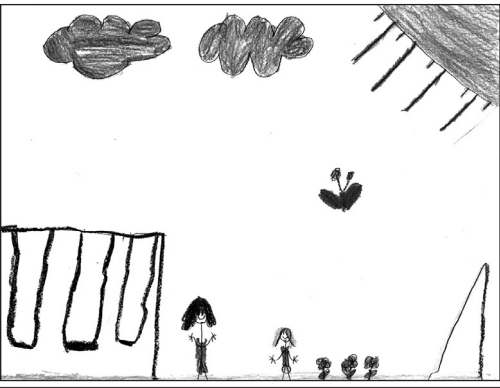

proud of Lennox’s drive and compassion.

“I love it. For her to get involved and give back at her age is huge,” Stover said.

Sponsoring the evening’s event, and offering a dinner from Chicken Annie’s was Deep Fission. According to Stacey Tarver-Patterson, the chief marketing officer, the Deep Fission project has moved into phase II, with the arrival of the prototype canister. Though, Tarver-Paerson noted that they are still waiting on the permit from Kansas Department of Health and Environment before the second well can be dug.

As previously reported, the Deep Fission pilot project has three initial phases, the first phase consisted of drilling a data acquisition well to 6,000 feet and completing tests on the geological samples obtained. The second phase includes drilling a full-diameter borehole, but not to the full depth.

“So what we’re doing is: we’re going to be testing the instrumentation and controls; the temperature, neutron detectors, things like that, and putting them down the hole.”

Brasel noted this second well will also eventually have a prototype reactor, with no fuel.

“We’re going to make sure we can put it down there, retrieve it, test all the equip-

ment out,” Chief Operating Officer Mike Brasel said during a meeting Deep Fission hosted on May 11.

He said the reactor operators who go out there and who will run all the testing will make sure all their procedures and processes work before moving forward to the third phase.

Of Thursday’s event, Tarver-Patterson said the community turnout was great.

“We’re so happy to be here. It’s a beautiful night.”

She also highlighted that Regional Stakeholder Engagement Manager Tara Mays has been a good addition to the local Deep Fission team.

In other Deep Fission news, on Friday it was announced that the Department of Energy has approved a Nuclear Safety Design Agreement from Deep Fission, for its Gravity Nuclear Reactor. This approval establishes the safety framework that will guide the reactor’s continued development.

“This approval is a major step forward for Deep Fission,” said Deep Fission CEO Liz Muller of this milestone. “We believe our mile-deep design gives us the ability to move faster in the stages ahead.”

In Music in the Park news, Hoisington recommends marking calendars now, for next year’s kick-off show on Thursday, May 27.

Construction to move south of K-39 on K-7 rehab project

K-7 will be closed to through traffic from the K-39 junction south one mile to Cavalry Road in Bourbon County for excavation work starting the week of Aug. 10, according to the Kansas Department of Transportation.

The work is a continuation of the K-7 improvement project that is rehabilitating pavement, adding 6-foot shoulders, extending box culverts and conducting other work on the corridor from near U.S. 69 to near Farlington south of K-39.

K-7 remains closed to through traffic from K-39 northeast to near U.S. 69. Work on this section of K-7 is expected to be completed in September, conditions permitting.

After that, work will fully transition to K-7 between K-39 and 700th Avenue north of Farlington. This work also includes pavement, shoulder and box

culvert extensions. In addition, the culvert for Second Cow Creek drainage will be replaced.

The next phase will improve K-7 from Farlington to K-47 in Girard and is scheduled to be let for bids in September.

The official detour around the construction zone remains. A signed detour follows K-3, K-47, K-7, U.S. 69 and U.S. 54.

KDOT awarded the primary K-7 construction contracts totaling \$20.4 million to APAC-Kansas Inc., Shears Division, of Hutchinson.
