Ravens nix Crosby trade, sign Hendrickson

The blockbuster trade sending star pass rusher Maxx Crosby to the Baltimore Ravens is off — and the fallout from that reversal could have a ripple effect throughout the NFL as the new league year begins.

The Ravens quickly pivoted to Trey Hendrickson, agreeing on a four-year, \$112 million deal with the four-time Pro Bowl edge rusher on Wednesday morning, a person with knowledge of the deal told The Associated Press.

The Las Vegas Raiders said Tuesday night that Baltimore backed out of the trade that was supposed to send Crosby to the Ravens for two first-round draft picks. The deal was agreed to last Friday but couldn't be finalized until Wednesday.

A person with knowledge of Baltimore's decision told the AP that Crosby failed his physical. The person

spoke on condition of anonymity because those results are private.

Crosby had surgery in January to repair a torn meniscus in his left knee. He missed the final two games of the season because of the injury despite wanting to play through it at the time.

Crosby said on a recent appearance on "The Herd with Colin Cowherd" that he was "ahead of schedule" in his rehab.

One of his agents, CJ LaBoy, posted on social media Tuesday night that Crosby is recovering well under the care of noted orthopedist Dr. Neal ElAttrache.

"Maxx continues to be on track in his recovery and if anything is ahead of schedule according to his surgeon," LaBoy wrote. "Maxx remains on track to return during the offseason program & will undoubtedly return as the dominant game wrecker he has been these past 7 seasons."

Crosby's addition was supposed to help lift the Ravens over the top, with the draft picks expected to be part of a rebuilding effort for the Raiders. The 28-year-old Crosby had 10 sacks and a career-high 28 tackles for loss last season, and has reached double-digit sacks four times in his seven seasons.

Trading even one first-round pick for a veteran was out of character for Baltimore, which has taken drastic measures to try to recover from last season's 8-9 showing. The Ravens fired coach John Harbaugh after 18 seasons and then were prepared to give up a lot for Crosby. His expected addition made Monday — when Baltimore lost several free agents to new agreements elsewhere — a bit easier for Ravens fans to bear.

Tyler Linderbaum, a Pro Bowl center for Baltimore, agreed to a contract with the Raiders. Tight end Isaiah Likely, punter

first hole to beat Kingston Solomon and Bruce Renz of Rockhurst, Eric Klutke of Benedictine-Mesa, Olivier van Goor of Ottawa University Arizona and Carson Boe of Concordia-St. Paul.

White carded two rounds of 1-under 71 and overcame a two-stroke deficit after the first round.

The Gorillas' Tyler Hardtarfer shared the first-round lead at 69 but wound up tied for 11th place at 144 after a final-round 75.

Jack Randall tied for 15th place with 71-75-146, Keaton Thissen tied for 25th with 72-76-148, and Forth tied for 49th with 78-76-154.

PSU's Theo Juhl, competing as an individual entry, also shot 148 (74-74).

Bam! Adebayo scores 83 points

MIAMI (AP) — It's Wilt, then Bam.

Bam Adebayo had a night for all time on Tuesday, with a point total second to only Wilt Chamberlain in the NBA record books. Adebayo scored 83 points, setting league marks for free throws made and attempted in

a game for the Miami Heat in a 150-129 win over the Washington Wizards.

Chamberlain's record of 100 points has stood since 1962. Kobe Bryant — one of Adebayo's basketball heroes — was No. 2 on the list with 81. Adebayo never thought he'd be in that club.

And then came a night he'll never forget.

The Gorillas have two entries in the heptathlon with Leo Chauchard fourth at 5,347 points and Drew Wilhite 11th at 5,197.

In the field events, Grayson Smith and Braylon Brown are tied for sixth with a clearance of 17 feet, 2.25 inches.

Jack Haukap is ranked No. 9 in the weight throw (67-10.75). Xavier Byers is 10th in the high jump (7-0.50), and Drake Stapleton is 11th in the shot put (60-0.25) and 17th in the weight throw (66-4.75).

Johnetheon Lockett qualified 12th in the triple jump (49-9.75), and Isaiah Webster is 15th in the long jump (24-2.50) and 16th in the triple jump (49-8.50).

Kevar Williams and William Seitz are alternates on the 4x400 and DMR relays, respectively.

WOMEN

Jazmine Williamson qualified in three events, ranked No. 2 in the long jump (20-5.25), No. 11 in the high jump (5-8.75) and No. 13 in the triple jump (40-3.25).

Also in the long jump, Blakelee Winn ranks sixth (20-2.50) and Brooklyn Baker is 11th (19-11).

PSU has two more high jump entries as Rachel Wilson is seeded second (5-10.75) and Bethany Umbarger fifth (5-9.75).

Paige Mullen qualified fourth in the 5,000 meters (16:09.40) and 11th in the 3K (9:27.56).

The 4x400 relay team of Nikole Cozort, Isabel Abedouch, Kinleigh Hall and Mikah Edwards qualified fifth at 3:40.50. Piper Hula is the alternate.
